# NAG Library Function Document nag\_zhptrf (f07prc)

# 1 Purpose

nag\_zhptrf (f07prc) computes the Bunch-Kaufman factorization of a complex Hermitian indefinite matrix, using packed storage.

# 2 Specification

# 3 Description

nag\_zhptrf (f07prc) factorizes a complex Hermitian matrix A, using the Bunch-Kaufman diagonal pivoting method and packed storage. A is factorized as either  $A = PUDU^{\rm H}P^{\rm T}$  if  ${\bf uplo} = {\rm Nag\_Upper}$  or  $A = PLDL^{\rm H}P^{\rm T}$  if  ${\bf uplo} = {\rm Nag\_Lower}$ , where P is a permutation matrix, U (or L) is a unit upper (or lower) triangular matrix and D is an Hermitian block diagonal matrix with 1 by 1 and 2 by 2 diagonal blocks; U (or L) has 2 by 2 unit diagonal blocks corresponding to the 2 by 2 blocks of D. Row and column interchanges are performed to ensure numerical stability while keeping the matrix Hermitian.

This method is suitable for Hermitian matrices which are not known to be positive definite. If A is in fact positive definite, no interchanges are performed and no 2 by 2 blocks occur in D.

# 5 Arguments

## 1: **order** – Nag OrderType

Input

On entry: the **order** argument specifies the two-dimensional storage scheme being used, i.e., row-major ordering or column-major ordering. C language defined storage is specified by **order** = Nag\_RowMajor. See Section 2.3.1.3 in How to Use the NAG Library and its Documentation for a more detailed explanation of the use of this argument.

Constraint: order = Nag\_RowMajor or Nag\_ColMajor.

#### 2: **uplo** – Nag UploType

Input

On entry: specifies whether the upper or lower triangular part of A is stored and how A is to be factorized.

```
uplo = Nag_Upper
```

The upper triangular part of A is stored and A is factorized as  $PUDU^{H}P^{T}$ , where U is upper triangular.

```
uplo = Nag_Lower
```

The lower triangular part of A is stored and A is factorized as  $PLDL^{H}P^{T}$ , where L is lower triangular.

Constraint: **uplo** = Nag\_Upper or Nag\_Lower.

3:  $\mathbf{n}$  – Integer

On entry: n, the order of the matrix A.

Constraint:  $\mathbf{n} \geq 0$ .

4: ap[dim] - Complex

Input/Output

**Note**: the dimension, dim, of the array ap must be at least  $\max(1, \mathbf{n} \times (\mathbf{n} + 1)/2)$ .

On entry: the n by n Hermitian matrix A, packed by rows or columns.

The storage of elements  $A_{ij}$  depends on the **order** and **uplo** arguments as follows:

```
if order = Nag_ColMajor and uplo = Nag_Upper, A_{ij} is stored in \mathbf{ap}[(j-1) \times j/2 + i - 1], for i \leq j; if order = Nag_ColMajor and \mathbf{uplo} = Nag_Lower, A_{ij} is stored in \mathbf{ap}[(2n-j) \times (j-1)/2 + i - 1], for i \geq j; if order = Nag_RowMajor and \mathbf{uplo} = Nag_Upper, A_{ij} is stored in \mathbf{ap}[(2n-i) \times (i-1)/2 + j - 1], for i \leq j; if order = Nag_RowMajor and \mathbf{uplo} = Nag_Lower, A_{ij} is stored in \mathbf{ap}[(i-1) \times i/2 + j - 1], for i \geq j.
```

On exit: A is overwritten by details of the block diagonal matrix D and the multipliers used to obtain the factor U or L as specified by **uplo**.

5: ipiv[n] – Integer Output

On exit: details of the interchanges and the block structure of D. More precisely,

if  $\mathbf{ipiv}[i-1] = k > 0$ ,  $d_{ii}$  is a 1 by 1 pivot block and the *i*th row and column of A were interchanged with the kth row and column;

if **uplo** = Nag-Upper and **ipiv** $[i-2] = \mathbf{ipiv}[i-1] = -l < 0$ ,  $\begin{pmatrix} d_{i-1,i-1} & \bar{d}_{i,i-1} \\ \bar{d}_{i,i-1} & d_{ii} \end{pmatrix}$  is a 2 by 2 pivot block and the (i-1)th row and column of A were interchanged with the lth row and column;

if  $\mathbf{uplo} = \text{Nag\_Lower}$  and  $\mathbf{ipiv}[i-1] = \mathbf{ipiv}[i] = -m < 0$ ,  $\begin{pmatrix} d_{ii} & d_{i+1,i} \\ d_{i+1,i} & d_{i+1,i+1} \end{pmatrix}$  is a 2 by 2 pivot block and the (i+1)th row and column of A were interchanged with the mth row and column.

6: **fail** – NagError \*

Input/Output

The NAG error argument (see Section 2.7 in How to Use the NAG Library and its Documentation).

# 6 Error Indicators and Warnings

# NE\_ALLOC\_FAIL

Dynamic memory allocation failed.

#### **NE BAD PARAM**

On entry, argument (value) had an illegal value.

#### **NE SINGULAR**

Element  $\langle value \rangle$  of the diagonal is exactly zero. The factorization has been completed, but the block diagonal matrix D is exactly singular, and division by zero will occur if it is used to solve a system of equations.

# 7 Accuracy

If  $\mathbf{uplo} = \text{Nag\_Upper}$ , the computed factors U and D are the exact factors of a perturbed matrix A + E, where

$$|E| \le c(n)\epsilon P|U||D||U^{\mathrm{H}}|P^{\mathrm{T}},$$

c(n) is a modest linear function of n, and  $\epsilon$  is the **machine precision**.

If  $uplo = Nag\_Lower$ , a similar statement holds for the computed factors L and D.

#### 8 Parallelism and Performance

nag\_zhptrf (f07prc) makes calls to BLAS and/or LAPACK routines, which may be threaded within the vendor library used by this implementation. Consult the documentation for the vendor library for further information.

Please consult the x06 Chapter Introduction for information on how to control and interrogate the OpenMP environment used within this function. Please also consult the Users' Note for your implementation for any additional implementation-specific information.

# 9 Further Comments

The elements of D overwrite the corresponding elements of A; if D has 2 by 2 blocks, only the upper or lower triangle is stored, as specified by **uplo**.

The unit diagonal elements of U or L and the 2 by 2 unit diagonal blocks are not stored. The remaining elements of U and L are stored in the corresponding columns of the array  $\operatorname{ap}$ , but additional row interchanges must be applied to recover U or L explicitly (this is seldom necessary). If  $\operatorname{ipiv}[i-1] = i$ , for  $i = 1, 2, \ldots, n$  (as is the case when A is positive definite), then U or L are stored explicitly in packed form (except for their unit diagonal elements which are equal to 1).

The total number of real floating-point operations is approximately  $\frac{4}{3}n^3$ .

A call to nag\_zhptrf (f07prc) may be followed by calls to the functions:

nag zhptrs (f07psc) to solve AX = B;

nag zhpcon (f07puc) to estimate the condition number of A;

nag\_zhptri (f07pwc) to compute the inverse of A.

The real analogue of this function is nag dsptrf (f07pdc).

# 10 Example

This example computes the Bunch-Kaufman factorization of the matrix A, where

$$A = \begin{pmatrix} -1.36 + 0.00i & 1.58 + 0.90i & 2.21 - 0.21i & 3.91 + 1.50i \\ 1.58 - 0.90i & -8.87 + 0.00i & -1.84 - 0.03i & -1.78 + 1.18i \\ 2.21 + 0.21i & -1.84 + 0.03i & -4.63 + 0.00i & 0.11 + 0.11i \\ 3.91 - 1.50i & -1.78 - 1.18i & 0.11 - 0.11i & -1.84 + 0.00i \end{pmatrix}$$

using packed storage.
